3 C.E. Credits (ethics) - Intermediate Workshop**

This workshop will review the most common difficult ethical or legal issues faced by psychologists. These often occur in the areas of professional boundaries, confidentiality (including subpoenas and court orders), mandated reporting, and treating suicidal or dangerous patients. Consideration will be given to patient focused risk management strategies. This intermediate workshop, which assumes a basic understanding of Pennsylvania's laws, will involve collaborative learning exercises and participant interaction. **This workshop qualifies for three contact hours for the ethics requirement as mandated by the Pennsylvania State Board of Psychology.**

W-2: Neuropsychological Assessment and Rehabilitation: Person Centered Principles

Rehabilitation programs have been developed for brain injured patients. A working alliance between patient and practitioner is a key element of successful rehabilitation. This workshop will present information about brain injury, rehabilitation principles, person-centered methods and case examples of ways to empower patients as active participants in the rehabilitation process.

Contemporary violence risk assessment approaches provide a means for identifying high risk youth and their needs. More importantly, these assessment approaches present opportunities for treatment teams to align services with child specific risk factors. The Structured Professional Judgment model will be discussed as a promising practice for working with youth populations.

The workshop addresses erroneous diagnoses based on insufficient knowledge about deep structure adolescent motivation to be together with peers as much as possible to psychologically work out details of their growth task – identity. Normative behaviors are often misinterpreted as “rebellion.”

W-14: Assessing Memory with the WMS-IV

This presentation will introduce the WMS-IV, review changes and additions and describe refinements in interpretive procedures. Emphasis will be placed on new subtest content, new Index scores and Index and subtest level interpretive frameworks including an information processing approach to the analysis of subtest level performance.

Dr. McCloskey has been involved in test development and publishing activities for over 25 years. He is well known for his affiliations with the Psychological Corporation and with the American Guidance Service. He was the Senior Research Director for the Psychological Corporation. In that capacity, he directed the development of neuropsychological and cognitive assessment instruments and scoring software. At the American Guidance Service, Dr. McCloskey was an Associate Director and oversaw the development of thirteen well-known assessment products over the course of only five years, a rate of productivity never previously attained, and as yet unmatched in the field of test development. Since 2000 he has presented over 100 workshops on the use and interpretation of assessment instruments and interventions for local, state, national, and international organizations. Dr. McCloskey is a member of PPA's Continuing Education Committee, and received the Pennsylvania Psychological Association Award for Distinguished Contributions to School Psychology in June 2008.*

W-15: Change Strategies Used in CBT for Adult ADHD

About 4% of the adult population has Attention-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD). While medications are the most effective single treatment, cognitive-behavioral therapy (CBT) is an efficacious psychosocial treatment for this population. This intermediate workshop is designed for practicing clinicians and reviews specific change strategies used in CBT for Adult ADHD.

This workshop panel will present information on linguistic styles to use with children to obtain accurate information, including suggested protocols that are research-based for interviewing about child sexual abuse and parenting competence, taking into account the child's development level and a family's cultural background. The second part of this workshop will focus on the style of reporting what a child says (quoting or summarizing), as well as the issues of reporting enough content to answer the forensic questions without harming the child in some way.
